Richmond Symphony Welcomes Third Music Director Candidate, Laura Jackson

Richmond, Va. (Jan. 6, 2020)—The Richmond Symphony is pleased to host its third **Music Director Candidate, Laura Jackson**, from Jan. 31-Feb. 9, 2020. Jackson will lead a series of Symphony concerts and pre-concert talks in the community, including:

- Special Concert on Fri., Jan. 31 at 7 p.m. at Midlothian High School (Midlothian, Va.) with Julian Schwarz, cello
- Altria Masterworks concert on Sat., Feb. 1 at 8 p.m. at Dominion Energy Center, Carpenter Theatre, with Julian Schwarz, cello; pre-concert talk with Jackson at 7 p.m.
- Rush Hour at Hardywood concert on Thurs., Feb. 6 at 6:30 p.m. at Hardywood Park Craft Brewery, Scott's Addition
- Metro Series concert on Sun., Feb. 9 at 3 p.m. at Randolph-Macon College, Blackwell Auditorium (Ashland, Va.); pre-concert talk with Jackson at 2 p.m.

Jackson is currently music director and conductor of the Reno Philharmonic and has received praise for her artistry, leadership, innovative programming and creative community engagement over her 11-year tenure. She has also served as assistant conductor of the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra—the first female ever appointed to that position—and was selected by the U.S. State Department to lead the Algerian National Orchestra in 2013. In addition to guest-conducting engagements both nationally and internationally, Jackson also recorded Michael Daugherty's "Time Cycle" on Naxos in partnership with Marin Alsop.

Jackson is the third of five music director candidates leading the Symphony in the 2019-20 season and interviewing to follow former Music Director Steven Smith, who stepped down from the position at the end of last season. The other candidates are Valentina Peleggi; Farkhad Khudyev; Roderick Cox, who appeared last October; and Ankush Kumar Bahl, who is conducting concerts in January.

The Richmond Symphony search committee, comprised of symphony musicians and board members, received more than 200 applications before selecting the final five candidates. The committee is considering various criteria for each candidate, including musicianship and commitment to the community, but mutual chemistry between the audience and the orchestra will be paramount, according to David Fisk, executive director of the Richmond Symphony. The announcement of the new music director is expected in May 2020.
